

Plants That May be Harmful to Pets

The consumption of any plant material has the potential to cause pets to vomit and experience gastrointestinal upset. Consuming certain plants may be life threatening. This list, while not all-inclusive, contains commonly encountered plants that have been identified by the ASPCA or Humane Society to cause upset or be harmful if ingested.
